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## VARIOUS ARTISTS

The Best of Hard Rock Live, (Sire Records/Video airing on VH1 tonight)

Crass commercialism aside, the new compilation of Hard Rock Live highlights is a pretty fair piece of record making.

The 13 tracks are drawn from the VH1 Saturday night concert show, which seems mostly to be a way to fill spaces between commercials and promotional announcements.

But the editors of the album have chosen wisely, picking artists who span many years and many different rock audiences, from alt-rock grandfather Lou Reed to pop pranksters Barenaked Ladies.

The older acts fare the best. The Pretenders lead off by breathing new life into the classic rock war horse "Middle of the Road," while Mr. Reed shows he has aged with grace by rousing the audience with a little-know and overlong track.

The new bands are generally good — righteous babe Ani DiFranco and revivalists Blues Traveler ably show the flag for Gen X — with one major exception. Hootie and the Blowfish show why their mild, earnest rock fizzled after one album with a mirthless and disjointed version of "Hold my Hand".

But with only one clinker out of 13 tracks, "Best Of..." is a worthy live sampler. — S.S.
